Welcome to YouthPact!

WELCOME to YouthPact's first e-zine.

If you are new to the Peace4Youth programme, this will introduce you to the role which YouthPact can play in supporting you in your work and Peace IV project. If you have already been involved with YouthPact this will give you more information on further events that might interest you.

The role of YouthPact is to support the EU Peace IV Children & Young People's Programme. This cross-border partnership of Co-operation Ireland, POBAL, National Youth Council of Ireland and Ulster University is to support the work and workers in the Peace4Youth programme, who are running peace-building programmes for young people aged 14-24 across Northern Ireland and the border regions.

YouthPact offers training to youth workers to improve their peace-building work with young people, with a focus on key themes which feature across all projects:

- *Good relations and peace-building
- *Facilitating growth for and with young people
- *Engagement with hard-to-reach groups
- *What is youth work?
- *Citizenship and building social activism

YouthPact offers opportunities for project leaders and partner organisations to share and learn from each other, through reflective discussion sessions, sharing and learning events and showcasing the work through the E-zine.

We create and disseminate new and existing resources to Peace4Youth workers on youth work approaches, toolkits for specialised themes, on-line youth work materials and YouthPact Practice and Policy Papers to connect the impact of Peace4Youth practice with emerging government initiatives and policies in Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland. Feel free to forward resources to YouthPact that you wish to share on-line.

To boost the impact of the Peace4Youth projects for young people, YouthPact gather and distribute information on further programmes or opportunities that participants could join after their project ends, so if you have any further programmes or opportunities we can highlight these online or through this e-zine. YouthPact also brings young participants together to capture their views on their pressing issues and to feed their views on the value of the Peace4Youth projects back out to workers, organisations and funders, so that improvements can be made for the next group.

Approaches to groupwork

"The group grows by what it can share, and what it can share is what it can talk about and what it can talk about is its experience."



APPROACHES to Group Work was the second YouthPact training event, as part of its support and development role.

In this one-day seminar with Jarlath Benson held in Cookstown on Thursday, 17th April, participants considered Conflict and Chaos within a group and how a group can grow through conflict. The group explored the place and effectiveness of contracting as well as the power of making the group your co-worker.

Participants used the day to share and reflect on their experiences of facilitating groups and integrating new approaches into their groupwork practices with the young people involved across the Peace4Youth programme.

Worker reflections on the day illustrated increased efficacy in their professional role with one participant stating: "Best training I have ever done. Off to work with a sense of, 'I can do this' "

The Power of One

'Tuning into, listening to and flowing at the person's own pace. Yet how hard it is to really listen if our mind is full of other stuff? if our heads are turned in other directions? To be empathic, practitioners need to juggle a space in their minds to give the person individual attention'

IN MAY 2018 YouthPact delivered training in Belfast and Derry/ Londonderry focusing on mentoring.

Dr. Gail Neill, a lecturer in the School of Applied Social and Policy Sciences at Ulster University, facilitated the training, bringing her extensive experience in mentoring workers and young people across youth work settings.

The training moved from historical perspectives on mentoring to the range of types of mentoring relationships, pinpointing the transformative qualities and skills of mentors. Case study examples were used by Gail to bring these ideas to life.

Participants were particularly struck by the mentoring diary that Gail shared, as well as tales about Betty the mentoring dog, (highlighting walk, talk and diversion within mentoring).

The stories which practitioners shared of their mentees points to the profound impact mentoring can have on young people working with thoughtful committed practitioners.

The training was characterized by workers reflecting on their knowledge and experience with a desire to learn more in order to provide a rich quality experience for young people.

Cluster Groups in Derry and Monaghan

OVER the last couple of months YouthPact have been running geographical 'Cluster Groups', with the first North-West cluster hosted by the Verbal Arts Centre in Derry/Londonderry on May 25th, 2018; and the second on June 15th in Pobal, Monaghan.

The aim of these groups is to bring delivery staff from across the projects together, to discuss the key issues that affecting them, their young people, and their projects on a day to day basis.

The Cluster Groups are facilitated by our Development Officer Daryl Moore and are carried out in a relaxed, interactive, and issue focused way. The content for each group meeting is very much led by the interests and issues that the participants highlight, with facilitated



discussions and explorations on common themes emerging from across the projects. The Dalai Lama appreciates the power of learning through sharing: 'When you talk, you are only repeating what you already know. But if you listen, you might learn something new'.
