SUMMER REPORT 2023

Following the wrap up of the 2022/23 delivery year, the team have taken the opportunity of the summer months to flesh out our plans for the coming year, in refining and developing our programme delivery. We aim to simplify our messaging, improve accessibility to our young people and deliver as high quality a programme as we can.

The summer months also allowed us to explore some new partnerships and relationships, and of course, gear up towards our second international CIFL experience.

Team member Muireann was delighted to attend the Ballymun Youth Resource Centre in July where the Future Leaders group received a Garda Youth Award, recognising them for the value of their social action project in making a positive contribution to their community.





Smith, member of the Aaron Leaders design group and now valuable member of our sessional delivery staff, supported 4 of our independent learners to deliver several themed identity workshops as part of a 'Diversity and Inclusion' youth conference in Corrymeela, Ballycastle this summer. The conference was delivered by 4Ward 2Together Youth Group, Kilmarnock Scotland, which brings together young people from across Scotland to tackle sectarianism. This engagement gave us this opportunity to recruit the group to CIFL and they will be working in a new East-West partnership with Ballymun Youth Resource Centre in the coming year on the bronze level programme.

PLANS FOR CIFL 2023-2024



We continue to build and develop the CIFL peace awards scheme. Not only as a reward to the young people who complete each level, but also as a mechanism to clearly demonstrate and offer progression and expanded opportunities as they stay with us for a number of years, thus achieving our ultimate goal of creating the next generation of peacebuilders.

To this end, we have analysed evaluations and feedback, kept the best bits and used the learning to put the peace awards at the heart of the programme design. A unique selling point for CIFL is the extensive range of good will, experience, expertise and networks we have at our fingertips through our Ambassadors, and so every level will have Ambassador interaction of increasing depth and length.

The previously named 'targeted groups' will now be known as the 'bronze level'. We have kept the same model, engaging with 12 school or youth groups, largely in areas of need North and South. They are paired up on a North/South basis and will follow a set structure with essential outputs, but have the flexibility to set their own content to suit their needs as a group.

The previously named 'self-starter' route now begins with the Silver Peace Award. This silver level award is designed to create a bridge for young people (graduates of the Bronze award or other Co-operation Ireland youth programmes) to transition from their youth/school groups to come and work with CI directly, forming a new all-island group.

The new 'silver award' launched at the showcase event Mav. and following application and interview process during the summer, we are pleased to report we have 32 young people signed up, who launched their new experience with a team building residential in Carlingford the first weekend in September. Young people travelled from near and (mostly!) far to attend and we thank them commitment their and for enthusiasm as they embark on this new phase of their CIFL experience.

The gold and platinum levels are in pilot this year and we'll be absorbing our East/West and International offerings to young people in these levels. Our long-standing 'Banking on the Future' programme in partnership with Net Eire at Morgan Stanley will become a part of the gold level, ensuring its legacy 13 years on from its inception.

Programme Plans 2023-24



We've been keeping you updated over the past year about our on-going development work with HawaiiKidsCan and after all their commitment and hard work, including a lot of early starts, the time finally arrived for 4 of your young leaders to visit Hawaii from 1-9 September.

The delegation visited schools and youth organisations in Hawaii to learn about how young people can actively engage in peace building and create positive relationships within and across communities. The group also participated in a cultural programme, working directly with volunteers and young people, and met with legislators to discuss youth advocacy and the impact of young people in contributing to peace building.

We'll provide a full account of the benefits for all involved in the autumn report, but in the meantime, our hearlfelt thanks to Brett Carey, Kekoa McClellan, and David Sun-Miyashiro of HawaiiKidsCan for their support in setting up the programme, and their warm hospitality during the trip.

Co-operation Ireland is looking forward to hosting a reciprocal visit from HawaiiKidsCan in autumn 2024 to continue the international exchange of cultural experiences, networking, learning, and sharing.

Back on solid ground, core programme delivery begins in earnest on the 20 and 21 September in Dublin, where our staff team and bronze level teachers and leaders will meet to plan their programme activities, explore opportunities for collaboration with our programme ambassadors and help inform the development of the programme over the year. We are looking forward to working with over 180 young people embarking on a new journey for the 2023-24 programme with us and can't wait to see what they accomplish!




Katrina McIlmail
